Gloor is a Dutch name. The name means luster or shine. Our ancesters migrated from Holland to Switzerland. The Gloor's in Switzerland were quite wealthy at one time, but later lost their wealth as Aunt Anna or Gertrude put it"thru a Jew". From the loss of money the family seems to have seperated. One stayed in Switzerland, one became sea merchant and married a French woman. One went to Australia and one Franz to United States and possably Melanie Gretner's mother.

Grandpa Gloor (Frank) was unable to work. Herman went to work as a young man to help support the family. In the summer of 1947 we went to visit the family home on Vine st. Philadelphia. Herman quit his job as a boiler room engineer and came out to Calif. to live with us. He died about two years after my father died in 1949 in thw garage of our house in Aromas. Herman died of an enlarged heart. He is buried in family plot in Philadelphia.

When I was about five Uncle Herman and Grandma Gloor (Augusta) came out to Calif. tostay and my father to help with her medical care. She was bedfast due to a stroke and Herman took care of her with my mothers help until she died. Herman took her body back to be buried inthe same grave as Frank. This was about 1937.

Joseph and Edna had four children; Marion Currier-Foster, Mildred Currier-Loeppke, Bernal Currier and Violet Currier. Joseph was a cabinet maker. When Violet was 10 days old Edna suffered a cerebral hemmorrage which left her left arm paralized. Some time later Joseph left her saying he did not want a cripple for a wife. Edna was a R.N. but because of her arm she could not work in a hospital. She took in elderly in her home for care and she raised her four children doing that.
